Chapter 13 (XIII)

Chapter 13 is called “Deep Magic from the Dawn of Time” because there is a kind of magic or justice which was placed into the creation of Narnia from the very beginning, the dawn of Time. According to this Deep Magic, the Witch has the right to Edmund’s blood. His life is “forfeit” to her; his blood is her “property” and no one, not even Aslan – the son of the Emperor who created Narnia and the Deep Magic – can work against this “law.” This law is carved into the Stone Table, on which creatures are sacrificed or put to death. Deep Magic must be more like justice than like a man-made law because it is baked into creation so that if someone were to go against it, all of Narnia would be “overturned and perish in fire and water.” Justice can be cruel, harsh, and unavoidable.

Chapter 15 (XV)

Chapter 15 is called “Deeper Magic from before the Dawn of Time” because there is a kind of “magic” that the White Witch cannot know. She knows of the Deep Magic in chapter 13 and uses it to claim the right to kill Edmund. This deep magic is a kind of justice, which is placed into creation from the dawn of Time. However, before anything was created, the Emperor-beyond-the Sea uttered an “incantation,” a magic word or phrase, that the White Witch could not have heard or read. This magic word was probably “love.” An example of love occurred when Aslan agreed to take Edmund’s place and allowed himself to be put to death. Aslan became the “willing victim who ... was killed in a traitor’s stead.” Because of this deeper magic, Aslan’s loving self-sacrifice broke the Stone Table (of justice) and Death itself could start working backward. Deeper Magic shows that love is stronger than justice.

If you did **not** score as well as you hoped, you need to identify the reason!
