### "Legacy II"

- I. In the beginning of the poem the speaker says that his grandfather is uneducated, quiet, ignorant of English, and preoccupied with "simple things." The speaker doesn't seem to respect his grandfather.
- 2. Toward the end of the poem, the speaker calls himself "a poor fool / who went to college / trying to find [his] way back."
- 3. The spacing of the words resembles the points on a compass. They give the direction and are the direction.
- 4. The "center of the world" is a symbol for grandfather's wisdom. The exact place "where Grandfather stood / that day" may be his farm or it may symbolize a point where the truly important things in life come into focus or perspective.

#### "Birdfoot's Grandpa"

- I. The old man (grandpa) is trying to save toads by helping them across the road so that they do not get run over by the car.
- 2. The speaker thinks the old man is wasting his time. ("you can't save them all / ... / we've got places to go")
- 3. "lights and leaping, / live"
- "saying / you can't save" "smiled and said"
- 4. The headlights of the car light up the rainy mist around the old man's head forming a halo a sign of holiness; the leathery hands reveal that the man has worked with this hands all his life; the old man's wisdom extends from the earth to the heavens.
- 5. "[The toads] have places to go to / too" suggests that not only humans have goals and a purpose ("we've got places to go") but so do other creatures, and we humans should respect the purposes of nature.
