Proverbs are like **theme statements**. Even proverbs about animals are really about human beings.

a) literal:

a leopard cannot alter, move, change the color or shape of its spots (markings)

b) apply to people or broaden the topic:

a person cannot change his or her natural tendencies, personality, characteristics

c) connect to, or make up, a story:

Tips for interpreting a proverb:

- See if the proverb makes sense on a common sense, literal level: "Leopards cannot move their spots or take them away."
- Ask, "What does each part of the proverb stand for?" The leopard stands for a person; the spots stand for personality or nature.
- Keep Guessing. You should arrive at a theme - a statement about human nature.
- Support your idea with a story you have read or made up.
