All of our athletic, musical and academic programs are successfully up and running. We are working closely with our PTA groups in all of our buildings to allow complete access to our facilities and allow children and families access to all of their incredible events.

As we continue through the year and look forward to the future, Frontier Central School District is transitioning into the budget season. This year the District is the benefactor of additional funding from the American Rescue Plan (ARP) and the Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act (CRRSA)

which will directly assist in the establishment of programs to address students' learning needs and their social-emotional wellness. As the budget process continues and we internally audit our programs, I invite the community to follow the budget process on our website and/or conversations during our District Board meetings. If you cannot attend the meetings live, please follow us on YouTube. You can find the links on the District homepage under "District News" on the day of the event, or access previous Board meetings in the Board of Education section on the website. As a reminder the District's budget hearing is May 3, 2022, followed by the budget vote on May 17, 2022.

The SOAR capital project is up and running! Currently Phase 1 of the SOAR project is under review at the State Education Office. The District anticipates approval of Phase 1a which includes considerable construction work on our high school athletic complexes, and all of our elementary buildings. Highlighted work at the elementary schools includes:

- New playgrounds
- Upgraded kitchen lines
- Renovated classroom space at Pinehurst Elementary
- Parking lot renovation at Big Tree Elementary

Phases II, III and IV will address the middle school, high school, all-purpose athletic field with lights and further infrastructure components in all of our buildings.

Finally, I would like to remind the community to continue to follow all of the District's activities and events in the Falcon Community Update. Spring is around the corner - Go Falcons!


